What Should We Expect from Government?

That's a reasonable question that generates a lot of unreasonable responses. As your chairman, I hear plenty of them. Some (thankfully few) express blatantly selfish visions, catering to their own needs. Others spell out a perfect world. That would be nice, but the world's best-selling book tells us that will not be in place until this world's Creator returns and establishes His government. So, what should we strive to create in the interim? I believe our founding fathers had it correct: "Governments are instituted among Men, deriving their powers from the consent of the governed,..."

Our founding fathers knew there would never be an "ideal candidate." Therefore, they set up our government of checks and balances. Sure, the president gets to stand at a podium and speak for the nation, but Congress tells him whether he can have the money to pursue his vision. Whether we like it or not, we are always voting for the lesser of two evils. "Let God be true, and every human being a liar." (Romans 3:4, NIV) Did you catch that? None of us is perfect, whether voter or candidate, and thus none is perfect in our execution of those duties. Am I really the only one who has ever regretted a vote I made?

I hope every member, no matter how much we agree or disagree on details, can join me in pursuing the security of the rights of the individual, just as our founding fathers said they desired.
